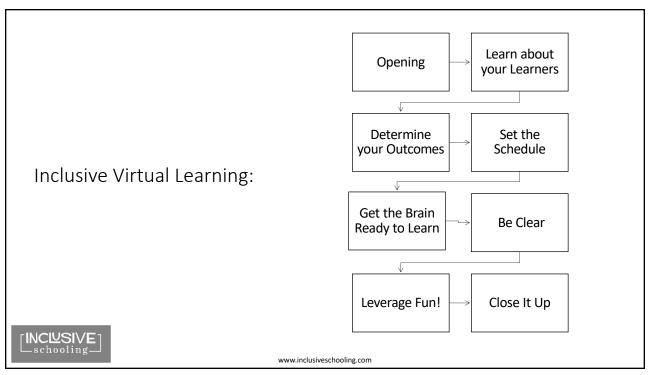

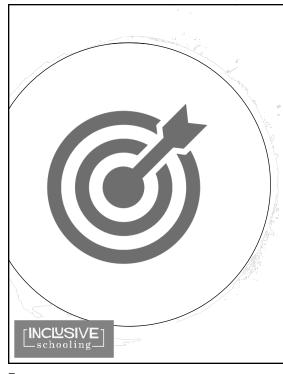
Unique ideas for opening a virtual session

The goal of the opening is to gain attention and get everyone prepared for the topic of study.

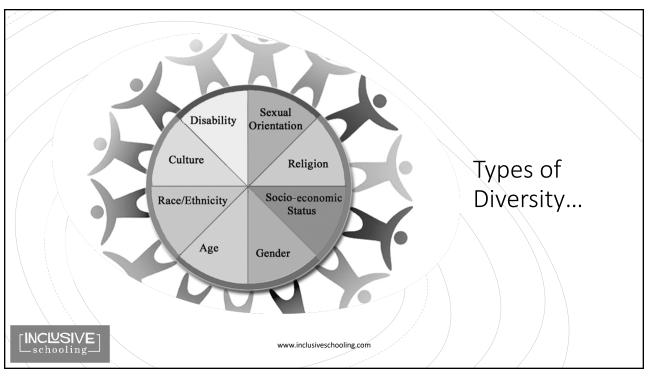
- You want to capture interest

- A good opener lasts less then 5 minutes

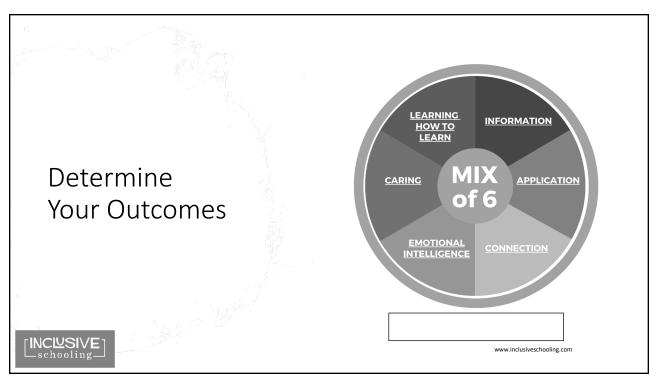

- 13. What else can you think of that will make you even 10% more comfortable?

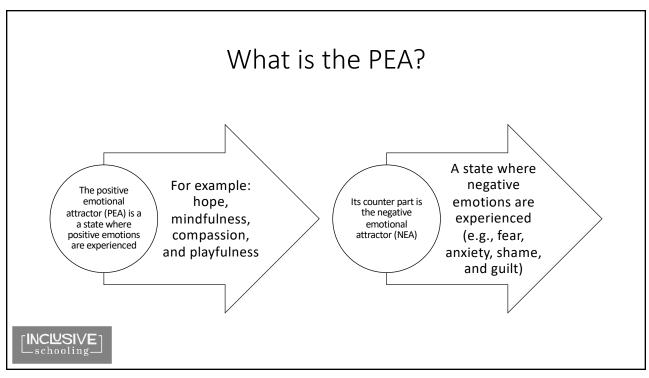
You and Your ZOOM Screen

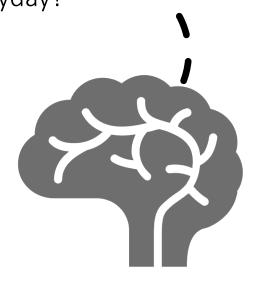
PEA vs NEA...which is better?

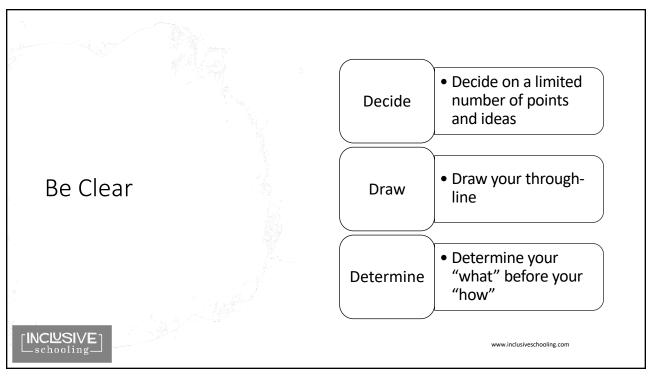

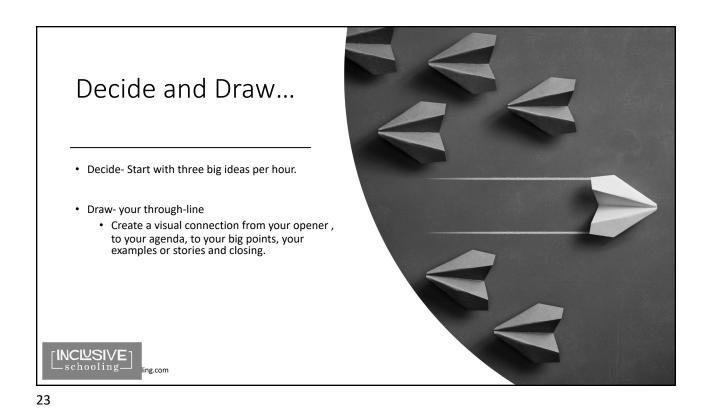

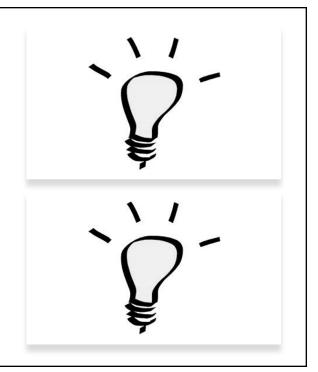


Leverage Fun!

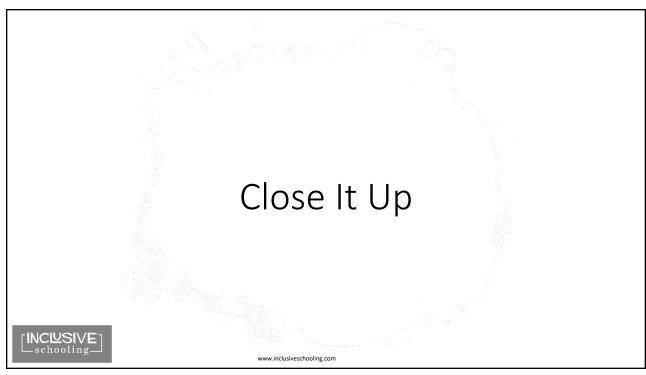
Why use Fun Theory?

- Research links engagement and increased levels of dopamine with greater motivation, increased learning outcomes and higher retention levels
 - (Healy, A. & Bourne, L., 1995, Jensen, E., 2006; Jensen, E., & Kiley, T. J., 1998; Rea, D., Millican, K. P., & Watson, S. W., 2000; Willis, J., 2005).
- Keep in mind Research shows that fun learning works best when the activity is meaningful to the student

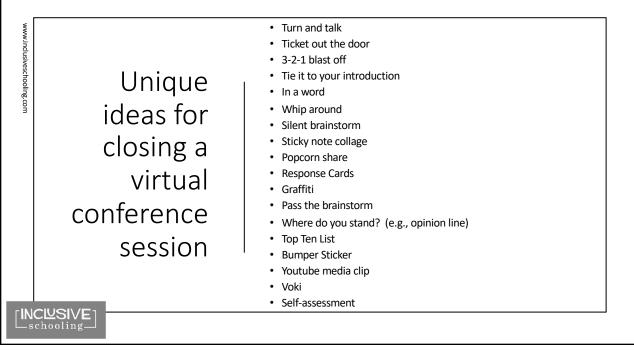
Close it up!
